Moments Matter – Attendance Counts

As parents and as a school, we share the same desire for each and every child to fully achieve their potential. Good school attendance is key to this.

In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent pupils (pupils who miss 19 or more school days) in KS2 achieved the expected KS2 standards compared to 84% of pupils who attended school regularly. This pattern also continues for GCSE results.

It is never too late to benefit from school attendance as gaps can be closed when attendance is good for a sustained period. Moments matter, attendance counts!

On Tuesday 16th July we will be holding a Careers Fair for our Year 6 children during the afternoon. If any parents are willing to spare some of their time to come in and talk about their jobs with our Year 6 children, please could you let school office know by **Friday 24**th **May.**

Reception: What do you know about minibeasts?

Year 1: What is half of 12? What is a quarter of 12? How do you know?

Year 2: Can you describe one of the layers of the ocean?

Year 3: Can you identify different times of the day using a 24-hour clock?

Year 4: What advice would you give a Norman King about how to build their castle?

Year 5: Why do we have day and night on Earth?
Year 6: What connected the Caribbean to the UK?

Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading fiction text.

-Who is the main character?


- -What is the setting in the story? Does the setting change?
- -What was the problem in the story and how was it solved?
- -Did the character change during the story? How?
 -How are you like the main character? How are you
 different?
- -What do you predict will happen next in the story?
- -Why do you think the author chose this title for the story?
- -Do you like the title of the story? Why or why not?
 -Can you think of a different title for the story?
- -Which character from the story would you choose to be your friend? Why?
- -Which part of the story was the most exciting? Why?
- -Did you like the end of the story? Why or why not?
- -Which parts in the story could really happen? Which parts could not really happen?

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READ, READ!

Reading is a key skill which is so important to any child's development at any age. Please try to listen to your child read at least once a day (for 10-15 mins ideally). It's also great for children to listen to you reading aloud as well.

As you know, our children in Years 1-6 have access to thousands of books online via myON. If you need help accessing this, please contact your child's class teacher or the school office.



Help your child become a better READER

Questions to ask your child while reading nonfiction text.

-What is the main idea of the text?

-Can you tell me something you already know about this topic?

-What did you learn from reading the text?

-Are there any words that you do not know what they mean?

-What are some new words that you learned?

-Do you have any questions after reading this?

-Were there any features (diagrams, charts, pictures)
that were important?

-Where could you find out more information about this topic?

-What questions would you ask the author about this topic?

-What would be a good title for this text?

-Can you think of another book that you have read about this topic? How was it similar? How was it different?

-Did you like the text? Why or why not?
